### FROM THE DESK OF THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

Thank you very much for supporting our parish ministries in various ways and for wearing a face mask to Mass. I strongly encourage you to keep wearing it before, during and after the Mass because Covid-19 is still out there.

These are the things to expect in our parish:

- 1. We are celebrating daily Mass in the Church with a limited number of people. No reservation is necessary to attend a daily Mass but be sure to sign in yourself at the back of the Church.
- 2. Our parish individual confession started again on June 3rd: We are using the meeting room located at the Church basement for confessions until the new restriction is lifted.
- 3. Individual Anointing of the Sick and Last Sacrament will continue uninterrupted but there will be no public Anointing of the Sick.
- 4. Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament has started again in Church since June 3rd.
- 5. Our Church doors will remain open daily for Mass, private prayers and devotion, but will be closed on Wednesday after Mass, rosary and confession until 5:30pm on Thursday. During this time, Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament will be going on in the Church. If you need to get into the Church for any reason during this time, please go through the Divine Mercy Chapel door using a code, which you can obtain from the parish office.
- 6. We have returned to weekend Mass schedules with a limited number of people (105 people per Mass). You will be able to attend the weekend Mass by reservation only. Also, there will be no passing the baskets for collections. Therefore, there are some stationionary collection baskets at the back of the Church to drop in your envelopes when you're at Mass.



- 7. You're highly encouraged to wear your face mask before, during and after the Mass; and during any public gathering in our parish.
- 8. You're highly encouraged also to visit our diocesan website for instant update on COVID-19 pandemic and other important updated information: (www.rockforddiocese.org).
- 9. Also, you're welcome to join our parish effort to send cards to our seniors to let them know that we care. There will be free cards at the back of the Church you can use for this purpose.
- 10. Dispensation given to all the faithful from the obligation of attending Sunday Mass has been extended until further notice. Therefore, there will be no need to include it in your confessions. Vulnerable parishioners are highly discouraged from attending Mass during this period of time. But, please continue to attend by watching the Mass from the comfort of your home.
- 11. Stay healthy, practice social distancing and pray a lot!
- 12. Please, prayerfully consider signing up for your weekly contribution online (detailed information is on our parish website); Otherwise, mail in your weekly contribution and your Diocesan Appeal envelope to the office or simply drop it off in a box at the parish office entrance. Thank you! The parish office is open daily for private work until 3:30pm.



### **And They Lived Happily Ever After...**

With those words, the handsome prince and his beautiful bride ride away from their royal wedding in a golden coach, all courtesy of a fairy godmother? And there the story ends! But what is the experience of the couple planning to be married at St. Charles Borromeo?

According to our church secretary, Deb, the process begins with the couple calling to reserve a date for the church. Once that is decided upon, the couple sets up an appointment to meet with Father Nnaso about six months prior to their wedding. In the meantime, the couple must reserve a place for their reception, create a gift registry, choose their wedding party, find a photographer, order dresses, invitations, a wedding cake, and flowers....no fairy godmother to take over all of those details!

However, preparing for the Sacrament of Matrimony involves much more. Bridget and Andrew Sessions, a recently married couple, described their feelings as they prepared for their wedding day this way, "We started our marriage prep with feelings of excitement, anxiousness, and nervousness. Excitement because we were beginning to plan our life together, anxiousness because we wanted the day to get here as soon as possible, and nervousness because getting married is the biggest decision we have ever made."

When the couple meets with Father, he makes certain they are free to marry in the church and that they understand the commitment they are making before God and the community in the sacrament. Then he gives them contacts for planning their wedding liturgy, the music, and the rehearsal. At that time the couple also takes the **Fully Engaged Inventory**, receives their **Fully Engaged** workbooks, and is assigned a mentor couple (currently there are three: Deacon John and myself, Deacon Jerry and Linda Ryndak, and Kel and Ginny Kissamis). They are to arrange



three meetings (about two hours each) with their mentor couple.

So far, almost everything the couple has prepared for deals with their wedding day. But that day is just the beginning of a whole lifetime together! The Fully Engaged workbook begins with these words, "The Fully Engaged program is designed to help you explore, both individually and together, specific areas that are central to a loving and life-giving sacramental marriage and to help to strengthen the foundation upon which you will build your life together."



The **Fully Engaged** inventory and workbook invite them to reflect with each other and their mentor couple on these areas: Differences, Recreation, Division of Labor, Family of Origin, Communication, Conflict Resolution, Finances, Catholic Identity, Intimacy, Catholic Parenting, Infertility and Adoption, Vocation and Career, and the Sacrament of Marriage.

The 3 meetings are held in the mentor couple's home and are comfortable times together for sharing. We have

met in our living room, around the dining room table, on the patio, and most recently during the COVID pandemic, over FaceTime! John and I love these meetings, but what do the couples think?

Bridget and Andrew, now married for about three months, had this to say when I asked, "... our marriage prep classes helped us learn more about each other to build a solid foundation for our marriage and our faith."

Teresa and Bobby Fandel, who proudly told me they have now been married two years and nine months and have a lively 1 year old, shared their memory of those Fully Engaged sessions, "For us, marriage prep was a great learning experience. It allowed us to dive deeper into questions and learn more about each other through our faith. We loved hearing stories from you guys about your marriage with its struggles and its joys."

Theresa and Dan Nicholson completed a slightly different program with us over 10 years ago and now are the parents of three children. They shared these memories, "We remember being a bit nervous, but we got insights on how to have a successful marriage. The program helped us identify topics where we had different points of view and then openly discuss them. We are thankful the marriage prep program was part of our journey, and feel so blessed to have celebrated our 10<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary."

Amazingly, even after over 50 years of marriage, we find that sharing with these young couples just beginning their journey of marriage helps make our marriage better. The two couples I quoted and several other couples we have mentored are still active members of our parish so we get to see them at Mass and watch as they begin their families.

So, unlike the prince and princess whose story ends with, "They lived happily ever after," we know couples will face joys and sorrows, gifts and challenges as they live their journey, but with the graces of the Sacrament of Marriage and the love and support of their faith community, we are confident they will live and love "happily ever after."

### Bringing Mass to Your Home

God never gives you more than you can handle, as my eight grade teacher Sister Bernadette Dwyer always said. Nothing can be more true. I would like to thank those who pulled together to help deliver the live streaming Mass to our community at home. A special thanks to Father Nnaso, my wife Tess, and my father Jim. Prior to COVID, my dad and I had zero experience with YouTube or any streaming platform, but with much trial and error we were able to figure it out. After the Governor decreed the stay at home order, my dad and I started doing some research on our options to bring Mass from our church to the community as a means to help bring a degree of normality to our daily lives. It took us a few weeks to figure out how to bring internet to the church, which we were able to achieve a bit before Easter weekend. Once we had completed that, the next obstacle was sound. From the unorthodox mass of cables, which failed us on a few occasions, to the very old webcam, we had our share of challenges.

When we reached out to Father to see if he'd be interested in letting us try to live stream the Easter Vigil Mass, he was extremely receptive. Therefore, on Saturday, April 11th, I ran over to church with a little webcam on a mic stand, a horrible mass of cables for audio and my wife's laptop and setup. At this time, we were extremely limited on how many members of the congregation that could be present, so I had to run home and control the stream remotely. A few minutes before Mass started, my wife gave me a phone call and we went live with the stream. I can't tell you how stressful this felt since if anything went wrong, there was nothing I could do except text my wife who was also cantering. When we ended our stream and provided feedback to Father on viewership, he gave us the green light to begin streaming Sunday masses.

After getting the thumbs up to continue, Tess and I decided it was time to upgrade our camera, so purchased a more-modern device which we tried during our next stream. A new camera meant new challenges. While the video quality was much improved, it also yielded a more yellow appearance. It took us a couple of weeks to find the right settings to correct this. We also have had a number of audio challenges as I'm sure you're aware of since Tess was in the choir loft and could only leave when liturgically appropriate. Up until Mother's day, we had a completely un-manned setup which meant there was little anyone could do during Mass if we encountered issues. After our last audio failure on Mother's Day, Father invited me to Mass so we could address issues real time. We wanted to solve our sound problem so we rummaged through our drawers and found an old piece of equipment that seemed to fit the bill so we decided to give a try. Luckily, it worked and we've been using it ever since with a few iterations to further improve sound. We have also added the Act of Spiritual Communion to the stream and a slide show of sacramentals from the church during Communion. In addition, we post the songs we'll sing during mass via myParish app [hint, hint].

Our experience streaming Mass gave us the courage to help with the school auction which was a huge success. The auction committee surpassed their goal, raising over \$90,000 for the school! Beyond streaming Sunday Mass, we have live streamed a handful of Wedding ceremonies. Throughout the process, we have encountered numerous other challenges such as internet issues, requiring streaming via cell phone, but we aim to deliver the best possible experience given what we have to work with. This goes to show you everything can fail at any time and God never throws anything at you which you can't handle. He is always with us! We plan on streaming until there is no longer a need and we're absolutely open to any feedback & additions we can make for a better experience. If you haven't joined us in church or viewed our live stream, information can be found on the parish website or via the myParish app. Stay safe and we can't wait to see you all back in the church for Mass!



#### **ASK FR. MIKE**

Q: I want to go deeper in my prayer life, but I'm not sure how to start. What is my first step?

A: Your first step is the one in front of you. I know that sounds like I'm out of the TV show Kung Fu, young grasshopper, but it is true. We all find ourselves at different starting points. That means that our first step is going to be our own; it is going to be very personal and unique to ourselves. And yet, there are some general guidelines that might apply to your case. A potential first might be your image of God. I cannot stress how important this is to get right. Not only because God deserves to be known as He has revealed Himself, but also because this will shape every subsequent step. If we are under the impression that God needs to be bribed into loving us, or manipulated into helping us, or placated when His "fragile ego" is bruised, then that will shape our prayer. This is the false image of the gods presented in the Greek and Roman myths: the gods were fickle, they couldn't be trusted, their "love" was arbitrary. It is represented quite well in the recent movie The Clash of the Titans. In it, the main message is "The gods need us. We grow more powerful the less we pay attention to them."

The Christian counterpoint to this could be expressed in the Catechism's teaching that, "Whether we realize it or not, prayer is the encounter of God's thirst with ours. God thirsts that we may thirst for Him" (CCC 2560). God's "thirst" for us is not arbitrary or needy. In His perfect self-sufficiency, God has made the irrevocable decision to choose us. This decision (this love) is constant, true, and free. A second help step might be God's image of us. Ask the question, "What does God think of me?" If we think that we are merely an annoyance to God, this will shape our prayer (it may even cause us to avoid prayer entirely!). God's image of you: you are completely unique in all of creation, you are precious to God, you are worth loving. That last piece is critical. I will talk with many people who wrestle with this wound. They do not believe that they are worth loving…especially in their weakness and sin. This wound is in desperate need of healing and this lie is in desperate need of being exorcized.

With these two thoughts in mind, there is a need to take the following step: in spite of the fact that God is infinitely patient with us and has irrevocably chosen us, it is our task to remove any known obstacles between us and God. Here are three possible obstacles: pride, unforgiveness, and distraction.

To root out pride, we must become humble. This doesn't mean thinking,"I'm so small, so bad, so inconsequential. It simply means telling the truth. And the first truth is that there is a God and you are not Him. It means acknowledging that there is Someone infinitely "bigger" and infinitely better than you. And that this Someone believes that you are worth loving. Humility always tells the whole truth; the happy truths and the hard truths. To know if you are humble, ask yourself, "Am I open to being taught, or do I resent instruction and correction?" The refusal to forgive hardens our hearts to God, to others, and even makes it difficult to know ourselves. If I am aware that I hold bitterness in my heart, I need to make some effort to express that I am choosing to forgive. This can be extremely difficult (and will most likely have to be repeated many times in some cases!).

Remember, forgiveness is not excusing someone's actions, and it is not ignoring real pain. It is the choice to "will the good of the other". While our emotions can still be inflamed, our decision to pray for someone's eternal soul (we could say "praying for their conversion... praying that God's will is done in their life") not only fulfills our Lord's command, but frees us.

Distractions can be anything that diverts our attention from what or who should have our attention at a given moment. Sometimes we utilize diversions for entertainment and stress relief; that's great. If recreation is what we should be doing, then games or entertainment aren't the wrong thing...they're the right thing. But if I invite distractions in so that I don't have to think about the present, then I am most likely keeping God out of the moment and out of my life. This step is nothing more than the "living deliberately" of which Thoreau wrote. Keep in mind that these are just some very simple beginning steps. None of them can be taken without grace; that is, without the help of God. But remember, God wants to help you take each of these steps. And He is infinitely patient with us while we are learning to walk. Next, we will look at what the next step might be.
