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From the Desk of the Pastor

Dear Parishioners,

Grace and peace of God the Father and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you

and with your family. We are very grateful to the Lord for allowing us to see the year 2020! It is a year of Divine Love for our parish and school. We are the people of God called to a new life in Christ. God's message of salvation is to guide our lives to act justly and to find a good reason each day to be joyful and to live in God's presence. Christ said that His new life within us has been sealed with His love and with His precious blood.

St. Paul reminds us that our different gifts are sources of blessings to unite us in love as the body of Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit to go into the whole world to



spread the Good News of salvation. God's mission must be carried out with love. For this reason, St. Paul says that if you give away everything you own, but do not have love, you're nothing. Fernandez puts it a different way saying, "Without love life lacks its prime and essential ingredient. The most sublime eloquence and all the good works imaginable would be like the fading reverberation of a booming gong or the clash of cymbals which lasts scarcely a few moments and then fades away into nothing."

There are a few things to expect in our parish and school in this new year of divine love. We will do a little repair in our divine mercy adoration chapel, fix the tuck pointing in our school east side of the building; a big school auction to pay down the accumulated debt as a result of the rising healthcare insurance cost, a capital campaign to tackle in advance the healthcare cost, bold programs to increase our school enrollment; positioning it to become more welcoming, prayerful and a spiritual institution.

We shall expand our preschool program to include PK4 all day and 5 days per week and finally, we shall revamp our marketing strategies and school website. We will make little tuition and other necessary adjustments to meet our school needs but we will initiate a Guardian Angel Fund program and Illinois Invest in Kids Acts to assist those families unable to pay the full tuition.

It is never too late to enroll your children in our fine school. Other programs to expect are: there will be a parish pilgrimage to Germany (Passion Play), parish picnic, and additional times for confession during Lent.

I strongly encourage you to be part of the new transformation experience that is taking place in our parish and school. Please pray for an increased enrollment in our school:

"O Christ, our teacher, we thank you for the gift of our Catholic School, where the message of your life, death, and resurrection is proclaimed; discipleship is modeled, worship of you is cultivated, and community is experienced. Increase our zeal for ensuring that all children and families can benefit from an authentic Catholic education, and that our Catholic School will grow in its ability to nurture the souls and form the minds of its students for generations to come. We ask this through the intercession of Our Lady, Mother of Catholic Schools. Amen."



<u>Lenten Reflection</u> By: Annette Palazzolo

"My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness" 2 Corinthians 12:9.

Lord, your grace is sufficient. I cannot tell you how many times I have unconsciously uttered those very words. Sometimes they are intentionally said within the structured time I set aside for prayer but more often than not, they are the words that flow unconsciously through me and from me throughout my day. When I took some time to think about that, I found that the very fact that those words strung together composes my go-to prayer, and the fact that they are freely uttered without a lot of mental focus said a good deal about me and my relationship with God. Lord, your grace is sufficient. Let's take the word sufficient...sufficient is synonymous with the word enough. Enough, That is a word that holds so much power over us as imperfect human beings, and often plagues the minds of people everywhere. Am I enough for my family? Am I a good enough friend? Do I do good enough job at work? Am I enough for this relationship? Am I enough for my children? Am I smart, pretty, intelligent, wealthy, strong, or interesting enough? Fill in the blank with any adjective and you get the picture. The world is constantly telling us we are not enough, whether it comes from the impossible artificial yet glamorous standards of the world or from our very experiences of someone making us feel less than or unworthy, the result is the same. We are left with this gaping hole that tells us we will never be enough and therefore, we are less valuable. Here lies the problem, we walk around with this complex and allow it to become part of our identity and it leads us to the biggest error of all; we apply it to our relationship with God. We start to get into this mindset: God, if you honestly knew all the terrible sins of my past, or all my brokenness you really wouldn't want me and you couldn't love me anymore because I don't even know if I can love myself. When we realize that God can and does see us and I mean really see us...past the masks we wear, past the lies we tell ourselves, we end up feeling ashamed. Now generally speaking, there are two responses to this. The first sounds something like this..."well, if God can't accept me for who I am and I am not going to be good enough anyway, I might as well peace out and live my life the way I want to." This always leads to separation from God, loneliness, and so much unhappiness. The other response is that we try to prove ourselves to God. This is where I often find myself. While the effort to improve one's self is a positive life change, especially in regard to our faith, it can become muddled when we fail and we are left with our feelings about not being enough. Here is where the prayer, Lord, your grace is sufficient, becomes so important. According to the Catechism, "our justification comes from the grace of God. Grace is favor, the free and undeserved help that God gives us to respond to his call to become children of God, adoptive sons, partakers of the divine nature and of eternal life (Catechism 1996)." There you have it, grace is a gift from God freely given. It flows from the Father because the Father wants to bestow it on you. Why? Because He loves you and wants you to share in His divine nature and eternal life. So what does this all mean? It means that God loves you so much that he looks at you, the real you-he takes into account all your successes, your failures, your strengths, and your weaknesses-and He still wants you. He sees your mess and it does not deter Him from loving you. Instead of rejection, He gives you His grace, He gives you the very thing that you need to get back up, try again, and keep seeking him. He tells you that yes, alone you may not be enough but that doesn't matter because He is enough and His grace, the one that is freely given, is enough for you. Think about that! Although I will never stop trying to grow into the person God created me to be, when I fall, He will always be there to pick me back up and I am not disqualified from his love. My worth and your worth, can only be found in Him for "power is made perfect in weakness." He can take all that I am, and still use me as an instrument for his grace in this world. Maybe I unconsciously repeat this prayer to myself so often because I need the reminder or maybe it has nothing to do with me at all, and just maybe it is God's reminder to me that He is there and that I am loved. So the next time you are stressed, or alone, or feel like a failure, or when this lenten journey gets tough remind yourself...His grace is sufficient and you are loved.





LOVE CHANGES EVERYTHING: THE BEAUTY OF BENEFACTORS AND BENEFICIARIES

Those who put their trust in the Lord are like Mount Zion, that cannot be shaken, that stands for ever. Psalm 125: 1.

It was a beautiful spring day; summed up with a clear blue sky and a perfect temperature most fitting for the month of May in the Midwest part of the United States. I was returning from West Des Moines, Iowa, after driving precisely 304 miles to visit a priest friend who had lower back surgery. My phone rang, it was the Seat of Wisdom Library manager's voice calling to remind me about submitting my article for the 2019 SOWL Newsletter. Although I was



still listening to the Relevant Radio Station, the rest of my journey back to my parish in Hampshire, Illinois was being interrupted by my constant meditation on the power of divine love; how it has the ability to change everything even the whole world. Also, the thought about my library benefactors and beneficiaries flashed back to my mind; I said my usual prayers for them, and my mind continued to wander on and on!

Certainly, the Lord calls us to be good and faithful stewards of His creation and of the gifts He entrusted to our care. Hence, I thought about the challenge of trying to know or figure out exactly what the Lord is asking us to do for Him or in His name. For instance, when the Lord called Samuel for the first time, he answered and went to the wrong person and place (1 Samuel 3:1-21); not knowing that it was the Lord calling him. Like Samuel, I have not been able to recognize the Lord's voice several times in my life and I still struggle with that same challenge. Nevertheless, there are two God calls that were loud and crystal clear to me: The first one was my call to the priesthood of Christ. I was able to recognize right away that it was the Lord calling me to His sacred office, but I vehemently tried my best to fight Him off. But, in the end, He won!



My second call was to build a library. Surprisingly, this time, I didn't fight the call, but I was confused and frightened because I had no idea how to go about the mission or maybe I didn't fight because I was still exhausted from my first battle with God; or perhaps, I recognized that just like a frightened animal at the vet, I was being molded into a new and better person. So, when the appointed time came, the Lord held me almost by the hand, infused me with the necessary knowledge, wisdom and zeal to accomplish the mission He has entrusted to me.

Therefore, whenever I reflect on the amount of sacrificial love that has gone into this project and the good it has done for so many people within a short time period, I thank God for using me as His instrument of love to achieve His divine purpose on earth. In this particular year, I want to sincerely thank my library benefactors for their solemn manifestation of divine love, stewardship, understanding, affirming, supporting, and nurturing the universal nature of the church built on one foundation, which is Christ-the Lord. Also, thank you very much for helping to untie many "donkeys." To you, my beloved friends in need, my beneficiaries, thank you for giving us the opportunity to serve you in the name of God; for you are the fertile land for which the Lord invites us to sow the seed of love and a kind generosity. Also, thank you very much for your silent prayers! And to you my beloved staff, thank you for your dedicated service; good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over shall be poured into your laps (Lk. 6:38). Over the years, many of my friends have asked me how I was able to manage Seat of Wisdom Library very well from a distant country and my response has always been "I am blessed with wonderful and dedicated staff." Please, keep up your good work!

At this junction, I would like to commend the soul of Frank Polizzi, Jr. to God for an eternal reward. Frank passed away on Thursday, October 25th, 2018 at a ripe old age of 97 years. He was just 3 months shy of 98 years (Frank was the gentleman who gave

me the first \$20 to start the Seat of Wisdom Library). It might interest you to know that Frank was extremely proud of the achievements of SOWL before he died. Unfortunately, on Thursday, September





19th, 2019, I received a chilling call from Mark Serpe's family that he had a heart attack and died instantly at a very young age of 66 years. It was very sad news for all of us who had known and served with Mark for more than 11 years. Mark became the chairman of Seat of Wisdom Library since 2008 until his death. He travelled with me to Abatete. Nigeria in 2015 for the grand opening of SOW Library. He made lots of new friends over in Nigeria. We will surely miss him! May his gentle soul rest in the peace of Christ, amen. In God's name, let us continue to light the candle of love and allow it to burn brightly for all to see Christ. A candle loses nothing by lighting another. We shall continue to pray and give the right worship to the risen Lord for his many blessings to us, each day. I strongly agree with St. Ignatius of Loyola, who said that all things are done for the greater glory of God (ad majorem dei gloriam). The best is yet to come! Divine Mercy, crown of all God's handiwork, I trust in you! Mary, Seat of Wisdom, Pray for us!!

As a little girl, I remember my grandmother telling me the story of the three little shepherd children, Lucia, Jacinta, and Francisco. During the week of the 100th anniversary of the visions, we were blessed to have the opportunity to spend a full day in Fatima. We walked through their homes and down the same paths they walked as they herded their sheep and prayed at the site of the apparitions.



It never dawned on me that the Angel of Peace, who appeared to the children before the apparitions of Our Lady, was sent by the Blessed Mother to teach the little shepherds how to adore Jesus, how to pray while adoring him, and the value of sacrifice. The Angel of Peace entrusted the Little Shepherds with this very special mission: to remind everyone that JESUS is truly present in all the Tabernacles of the world, and to make reparation to God for the indifference that is shown to His Son JESUS in the Blessed Sacrament (Children of the <u>eucharist.org</u>). As parents, we should follow the inspirations from the Angel of Peace, gather our children into the Eucharistic Presence of Jesus and allow them to rest in His Presence. In Matthew 19:14, Jesus calls the children: "Let the children come to me, and do not prevent them; for the kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these."

This reminds me of an occurrence I had in adoration. A mom and dad walked into the chapel with three small children who knelt on the floor in front of the monstrance. The mom suggested they say a prayer. They all chimed in with the Lord's Prayer. Then, she said, "let's sing a song" and their angelic voices sang Hail Mary, Full of Grace. As quickly as the entered, they left though the sanctuary door. Then I heard the tinkling of bells. I was moved to tears to witness the love this family had for Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament.

Pope John Paul II said back in 1996: "I urge priests, religious and lay people to continue and redouble their efforts to teach the younger generations the meaning and value of Eucharistic adoration and devotion. How will young people be able to know the Lord if they are not introduced to the mystery of his presence?" The Holy Father continues to stress this importance today. What we learn as children will remain in us and help us to stay close to Jesus. Spiritual Weapons: Fasting



"Fasting gives birth to prophets and strengthens the powerful; fasting makes lawgivers wise. Fasting is a good safeguard for the soul, a steadfast companion for the body, a weapon for the valiant, and a gymnasium for athletes. Fasting repels temptations, anoints unto piety; it is the comrade of watchfulness and the artificer of chastity. In war it fights bravely, in peace it teaches stillness." – St. Basil the Great

Are you struggling with a sin? I mean a sin that you just can't seem to get rid of; a sin that keeps you in a constant state of guilt and despair. You've prayed, you've frequented the sacraments, but you just can't seem to break its hold. We've all been there at one point or another, and such struggles are part and parcel of the spiritual life. But it doesn't have to be that way. Today, I want to introduce you to a very powerful, but much neglected weapon in the spiritual arsenal: Fasting. If you want to energize your spiritual life, if you want to slay a sin that has you in bondage, if you want to grow in union with God, take up the holy weapon of fasting. For as Jesus said, there are some demons which "cannot be driven out by anything but prayer and fasting." Let's examine this powerful weapon and its use in the spiritual life.

What's the point?

From her earliest days, the Church has taught the need for asceticism in the life of every Christian. That's right—asceticism is not just for monks and priests, but for laymen too. But what do I mean by asceticism? For our purposes, asceticism can be loosely defined as self-denial with the ultimate goal of self-control. And this self-denial most often takes the form of, you guessed it, fasting. Asceticism isn't necessary for everyone because of our passions—intense fleshly desires, which are sometimes referred to as concupiscence. Experience teaches us that we our often lead about by these desires in a way we can barely control. St. Paul tells us, "the impulses of nature and the impulses of the spirit are at war with one another."2 This war is so intense that our passions often lead us to do things we don't want to do, and we find ourselves saying, "My own actions bewilder me; what I do is not what I wish to do, but something which I hate."3 Keep in mind that the passions of our flesh are not necessarily wrong, but because of our fallen nature, they are out of control and they want to dominate us. Left unchecked, our passions will lead us to soul destroying behavior like gluttony, hatred, disordered sexual acts, or addictions of all kinds. Eventually, their dominion will lead us to hell. "The sinful passions... yield increase only to death," 4 explains St. Paul. Faced with the reality of the passions, it can be easy to become discouraged and think we can never overcome them. We cry, "Pitiable creature that I am, who is to set me free from a nature thus doomed to death?" Fortunately, that's not the end of the story, and we are not left as helpless slaves to concupiscence. "The spiritual principle of life has set me free, in Christ Jesus, from the principle of sin and death."5 Through the grace of God, and by walking in the new life purchased for us by Jesus Christ, we can overcome and subdue our passions. We can live as children of God, free from the law of sin that leads to death. So how do we find this freedom practically speaking? Again, St. Paul explains: "Nature has no longer any claim upon us, that we should live a life of nature. If you live a life of nature, you are marked out for death; if you mortify the ways of nature through the power of the Spirit, you will have life."6 "Those who belong to Christ have *crucified* nature, with all its passions, all its impulses."7 "I buffet my own body, and make it my slave."8 In other words, we find freedom from the passions by mortifying them, putting them to death, through the practice of grace-empowered asceticism—specifically, fasting.

Fasting helps us tame the wild stallion of our flesh and bring it under the bridle of self-control. In his apostolic constitution on penance, *Painitemini*, Pope Paul VI explains this point clearly: This exercise of bodily mortification—far removed from any form of stoicism—does not imply a condemnation of the flesh which sons of God deign to assume. On the contrary mortification aims at the "liberation" of man, who often finds himself, because of concupiscence, almost chained by his own senses. Through "corporal fasting" man regains strength and the "wound inflicted on the dignity of our nature by intemperance is cured by the medicine of a salutary abstinence."

How to Fast:

Now that we've discussed the purpose of fasting, let's take a look at how to build fasting into our daily lives.

- **1. Start with the basics** The first step in fasting is obeying the law of the Church—fasting on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, abstaining from meat on Fridays, and observing the Eucharistic fast (do not eat or drink one hour before communion).
- **2. Add more-** Accordingly, once you've begun to follow the law of the Church, build on that foundation to include fasting in other ways. Here are some ideas:
- Skip one meal extra a week, like breakfast or lunch. In addition to Fridays, Wednesdays are traditional days of fasting, so that might be a good day to start with.
- Deny yourself dessert on set days. Most of us eat too much sugar anyway. Skip salt on your food.
- Fast from soda. It's terrible for you!
- Skip the beer or other alcoholic drinks when going out to eat.
- Don't eat between meals. This sounds easy, but try it. You'll find it's quite hard since most of us snack frequently and don't even realize it.
- Include things besides food. For example, fast from all technology one day a week.
- Fast (one main meal with two small snacks) one day a week.
- Drink only water.
- **3. Fast from sin** Bodily fasting is meaningless unless it is joined with a spiritual fast from sin. St. Basil gives the following exhortation regarding fasting:

Let us fast an acceptable and very pleasing fast to the Lord. True fast is the estrangement from evil, temperance of tongue, abstinence from anger, separation from desires, slander, falsehood and perjury. Privation of these is true fasting.

- **4. Pray** Fasting is not simply a matter of will power. Grace is absolutely necessary. While fasting energizes prayer, prayer energizes fasting. Both are weak without the other.
- **5. Beware of Pride** "Be on your guard when you begin to mortify your body by abstinence and fasting," says St. Jerome, "lest you imagine yourself to be perfect and a saint; for perfection does not consist in this virtue. It is only a help; a disposition; a means though a fitting one, for the attainment of true perfection."

Conclusion

If we neglect fasting, our spiritual life will always be mediocre. We will be weak in the combat against our passions, we will easily succumb to temptation, and we will never truly overcome our inherent selfishness and self-indulgence. As men, our desire should be to strengthen ourselves and be the best that we can be. We should train ourselves to be strong in the spiritual warfare, so we can resist the temptations of the evil one. There is no better way to begin this spiritual training than through the practice of fasting.
